



Announcing the Artists for the Exhibition 2018!



As of March 6, we have 255 members of which 32 still have not paid for their 2018 membership. The breakdown per region is:

Robert Genn "Art Buyers" The Painters Keys February 27, 2018

"The collector", perhaps the most precious, is hot-wired for art. He has art in his homes, offices, yachts and closets. While he can sometimes be "sold" things, he loves a chase and a sense of discovery. He may be compulsive, even addicted - it's in his blood.

"The investor" looks at art and sees money. He tries to buy low and sell high. He uses terms like "important" and "flip." He knows about taxes and regularly asks about values "for insurance purposes."

"The decorator" needs something - often anything - to fill a space. Framing is important, as is colour. "Neutral subject matter" often fills the bill. He brings fabric swatches and may travel with a co-conspirator. "Trend" is big in his vocabulary - whether his inclination be period, retro, contemporary or kitsch.

"The believer" is the most innocent art buyer. He may be new to the game and feels the magic of it all - often sharing his excitement with an equally smitten partner. Art really speaks to them - they have a profound admiration and respect for creators.

"The moneyburner" has the dough and likes to get rid of it. He expects art to be expensive and reminds his friends of the figures. Because he "doesn't have the time," he's often a dilettante. He exercises his whims, but often asks the advice of those who are ready and willing to give it.

The Value of Watercolor

The question comes to me in many forms. How do we advance the reputation of watercolor? How do we get over the age-old prejudices against our medium? How do we

reposition the value of watercolor in the minds of collectors and gallery owners and print journalists and museum directors? How do we combat the idea that watercolor is a fugitive medium? How do we address the price differential between watercolor paintings and those painted in oil or acrylic?

I believe the answer lies with watercolorists. We need to believe in our

medium. We need to be more publicly supportive of our medium. We have to be the champions of our medium.

Pricing is a strong indication of how we value our watercolor paintings. To give the public the impression that they are as valuable or greater than oil or acrylic paintings, our prices need to reflect our pride in our work. Forget the \$100s. Think in \$1000s.

We are beginning to see a number of examples of artists who have moved the price point of their paintings up in the galleries in which their work is shown. Agreed, you have to be in the right gallery in the right geographical area of the country.

Artists need to understand the dynamics of the retail market. If you want success in the market you have to work to make that success happen. If

we continue to look for and support those establishments that do treat us and our work with respect, we will raise the value of watercolor across the marketplace.

We all need to become advocates and educators in this cause by submitting our best work to competitions, attend those exhibitions, support galleries and exhibition spaces that show watercolor, and go to opening nights for other watercolor artists.

Each of us plays a part in making watercolor a more important and desired medium. Get out there and spread the message. Watercolor is great!



Preston Head Wins the Tennessee Watercolor Society \$1,000 Art Scholarship

The Tennessee Art Educators Association (TAEA) sponsors a Scholarship Art Competition each year for West, Middle, and East Tennessee high school art students. James Dodson, director of TAEA, is the contact person for the awarding of the Tennessee Watercolor Society \$1,000 Scholarship. This is the third year that TnWS has offered this opportunity to a

qualified high school art student in their watermedia category. The check is sent to the student's college or university to apply towards art courses.

This year's winner, Preston Head, a senior, was awarded Best of Show at the TAEA Student Art Exhibition in the Leu Gallery at Belmont University in Nashville and the TnWS Scholarship in the TAEA Middle Tennessee Division with his self portrait, "Preston." He

is the son of Bobby and Donna Head, Hendersonville, Tennessee. Preston's art teacher at Hendersonville High School in Sumner County, Sandra Louise Kandros, spoke highly of Preston and his work.

Scholarship Chairman Tuva Stephens interviewed Preston and these are his comments:

HIS PAINTING: "I had wanted to try a self-portrait for a while, and I knew that I wanted it to be very stylized. I started

researching several styles of art and eventually chose Impressionism. I tweaked it to my liking before starting my painting. I used acrylic paints and palette knives to paint on a 36"x 24" canvas."

PLANS: "After I graduate, I plan on attending Appalachian State University in North Carolina. I am planning on majoring in Industrial Design and minoring in Fine Arts."

ARTIST CHLOE A. HARRINGTON, 101.8 Years Young

This Knoxville artist is a longtime member of TnWS (joined in the 1980s) and a lifetime artist in several media.



She began oil painting under the tutelage of eight instructors from 1968 on, including Monsieur Pierre Bordeau in Switzerland.

She attended numerous watercolor workshops in Knoxville conducted by noted artists: Rowland Roycraft, Janet Walsh, Alex Powers, Phil Austin, Ron Ranson, and Zoltan Szabo. Also Marilyn Bendell, Bradenton, FL; Barbara Nechis, Hilton Head, SC; Nita Engle, Wisconsin and Atlanta, GA.

Active in several art societies, Chloe belonged to The Knoxville Museum of Art, Knoxville Arts Council, Fountain City Art Guild, Tennessee Artists Association, the Kentucky Watercolor Society, and currently Tennessee Watercolor Society.

Chloe participated in many regional and state exhibitions: the Tennessee Watercolor Society 13th, 16th, and 18th annual juried shows, 1984-1989; The Dogwood Arts Festival Shows; Fountain City Watercolor Guild; Dulin Gallery of Art sidewalk shows; and exhibited her work in local banks, businesses and libraries.

Winning many awards in the exhibitions of these organizations, most recently "Best of Show" for her "Splash" watercolor painting in the Fountain City Watercolor

Guild's 2006 Spring show. She had giclee prints made of several floral paintings: "Stately Splendor" Irises, (the 1200 prints sold out in 2 1/5 days); "Floral Melody" Iris, "Poinsettia", "Say It with Roses", "Brandywine Iris" and "Splash".

Her paintings are in private and corporate collections locally, across the United States, and in eight countries from Canada to South Africa.

"After a two-year illness I am still active in the Fountain City Art Guild, Knoxville, with two shows a year."

Chloe continued to paint until recently, but maintains her interest in watercolor by watching artist's demos on TV, always eager to see new techniques. What an inspiring example for all artists young and old alike.

VOTES PASS HALF-POINT FOR SIGNATURE

Forty current members voted on the Half-Point amendment. Thirty six members voted Yes and four voted No. The vote passed and the following By-Law Amendment is the result of that action. [Amendment]

Amendments for Exhibitions and Signature Membership

Article II, Section 3, Paragraph 4. will be replaced with the following:

- 4. Signature Artist membership shall be attained by Active members by earning three (3) accrued points, from juried competitions of the Corporation, whose work has been selected by a juror (meeting the qualifications as stated in the bylaws Article VIII Section 4) and exhibited in:
 - a. Juried Biennial Gallery Exhibition (Biennial Exhibition, see Article VIII Section 1) —One point isawarded to the artist per each juror-selected exhibition and that the selected painting is exhibited insaid Biennial Exhibition.
 - b. Juried Biennial Online Exhibition (Online Exhibition, see Article VIII Section 2)— One Half point is awarded to the artist per each juror-selected online exhibition and that the selected painting is exhibited on said Online Exhibition.
 - c. Signature Status is permanent and is not lost if membership lapses.

Existing Article VIII, Section 1 will be replaced with the following:

Section 1—The Corporation shall have a Juried exhibition biennially for the membership.

- 1. The Juried Biennial Exhibition (the Biennial Exhibition) will occur on the even years, is held at aBoard selected Gallery, rotates around the state and is overseen by the Board and the hosting region.
- 2. The Juried Biennial Online Exhibition (the Online Exhibition) will take place on the odd years. It will be an "image only" exhibition. Paintings must be aqueous in nature but can be on a non-paper substrate, unlike the Biennial Exhibition, which is aqueous on paper substrate only. Size of painting is notrestricted. The physical painting is not required to be framed nor is it presented physically. The jurorwill meet the qualifications for jurors as stated in Article VIII Section 4.

Section 2, 3, 4 and 5 are unchanged. A portion of existing Section 1 will become Section 6:

Section 6 — Other statewide exhibits may be held at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

IN MEMORIAM

Dorothy Ann (Sharber) Gannon, 88, of Chattanooga, passed away January 6, 2018. Known as Dot, she was a TnWS member and her award-winning watercolors were in exhibitions from the 1990s through 2004. She founded the In-Town Gallery in 1974 and invited 11 other artists, including Mary B. Lynch, as charter members of the Chattanooga co-op. It has continued to thrive in its latest location on Frazier Avenue. She was actively involved for many years. She also established the Gannon Art Center and frame shop with her son Edwin.

Maurine Elaine McFeely Flaherty, age 73, passed away December 3, 2016. While a member of TnWS she taught children's art at the Fountain City Art Center, Knoxville, as a volunteer. Born in Roswell, New Mexico, she graduated from New Mexico State University in 1965 and began a teaching career. She taught elementary and middle school in four different states over the course of 36 years. She also was a sponsor of the El Paso, Texas Eastwood High School Y-Club from 1980-1989.
