## Paintings Selected for New Erlanger Children's Hospital Outpatient Clinic Memorial Collection

A year ago it was announced that the *Joan Clark Memorial Collection* of watercolor paintings would be selected from the artists of Tennessee Watercolor Society. Bruz Clark, Joan's son and President/Treasurer of the Lyndhurst Foundation in Chattanooga provided a grant of \$25,000 to Erlanger Hospital to purchase the paintings for the new Children's Hospital Outpatient Clinic (CHOC) to be completed in December 2018.

Now the moment has come. The head of the *Arts at Erlanger* committee, Katharine Toledano, announced their decision after personally viewing the paintings in the Clarksville Exhibition. Looking for child-oriented subjects, the 14 chosen are most appropriate:

"Content", Irma Herzog; "Eat Chicken", Judy Lavoie; "Front Loader", Mark Cobbe; "Trapping Light", Donna Littleton; "The Jubilee", Leslie McDonough; "Window Gazing", Brenda Brannon; "Sicilian Counterpoint", Helen Burton; "Iris Garden", Dorothy Bush; "Fellow Travelers", Harriet Chipley; "Waterfall", Lil Clinard; "Java Jumble", Barbara Jernigan; "Mane Heritage", Charlotte Nelms; "Gardener's Delight", Pat C. Patrick; and "Gangway" (box turtle) by Pat.

Congratulations to all! It is a unique privilege to have our art uplift the spirits of the young patients, their families, and hospital staff - an ongoing legacy as this is a permanent in-



stallation. Honoring the memory of our TnWS long-time member, Joan Clark, makes it very special for us.

The Erlanger Project Executive, Bruce Komiske, invites the artists to tour the new building and see their paintings in place. He is very proud of this pioneering center. It has already won the American Institute of Architects (AIA) Honor Award and will attract experts from around the world to see such an innovative complex.

With its new concept, it impacts over 50,000 outpatient

children versus 5,000 inpatients per year. It is universally appealing to all ages with "discover and learn" uplifting components, and reflects a "sense of place" in its unique environment.






#### TRANSPORTERS CUM LAUDE

They made sure the title blocks were put in the envelopes with each painting before carefully installing them in their appropriate padded bags.

Next was loading their vehicle with the 30 pieces, the show poster, box of catalogs and programs with stands. Then the long drive from Clarksville to Humboldt's WTRAC, to Bill Hickerson for his August exhibit.





Anne Davis driving her van with Mark Cobbe for four hours from Chattanooga to Sycamore Shoals to collect the 30 paintings for the final show at the Association for Visual Arts (AVA) in Chattanooga. In addition to manual labor, time on the road, obtaining vehicles large enough for their precious \$26,000 cargo, the volunteers had a tremendous responsibility.

# COLOR CORRECTION FOR ARTISTS By Nick Long



ACCURATE IMAGE FILES are key to increasing your probability of being selected for an exhibition. Your submission should be parallel in quality and presentation to your original artwork. Even if selected, your image may not accurately represent your original artwork as it should.

For the last three biennial exhibitions, there has been disparity between images submitted for judging—and for publishing in the catalog—and the original hung in the exhibition. Unfortunately, some images not properly adjusted specifically for print will not print correctly. Likewise, images not properly optimized for web viewing will not match the original artwork. \*

TWO PRIMARY ELEMENTS are at play here: the copy shot of the original artwork and the preparation of the resulting digital file to match the original artwork as close as possible. *ArtBeat* has previously published articles discussing how to photograph your artwork for the most accurate result. We will only take a cursory look at color correction as one adjustment option to increase your awareness of the necessity of makling image adjustments to digital art.

COLOR CORRECTING simply defined is the process used to make your digital file's color match as closely as possible to your ORIGINAL PAINTING. The process can be

daunting and complex if you are unfamiliar with color correction. However, there are simple ways to color correct if you have the inclination to research and learn, plus have appropriate software and computer.

In my research, I found WEB-SITES THAT EXPLAIN COLOR CORRECTION finding the gray point in the image in Photoshop using a tool called *curves*. This tool Is valuable in color correction but takes experimentation to gain the experience to use it properly. There are other tools —to include brightness and contrast—that can also be used to make image adjustments as well. If you are hands -on, learning the process will become easier with each image.

#### No.1 in a Series on Artists' Unusual Sidelines

Chattanooga Carousel Figures Illustrated by Helen Burton Soon Will Brighten Rooms in New Children's Hospital

In 1999 when the Chattanooga Carousel opened in Coolidge Park, Helen Burton met Bud Ellis, the man who put it all together. His carving school, "Horsin' Around" was where interested persons from all over the country came to learn how to carve a carousel figure out of basswood. The result was the 54 assorted animals and horses that form three rows of figures on the Coolidge Park carousel. They were handmade by 30 men and women.

For the grand opening Bud Ellis wanted to have a paper crown designed and printed for children to wear when they rode the carousel. Helen agreed to create it, and the printing company owned by the park's namesake, Charles Coolidge, printed these special souvenirs.

Helen portrayed a lion, a tiger, two horses and a giraffe in an ornate design reflecting the carousel decorations. That began her interest in illustrating more of the figures that soon became a collection of 37 in a few years.

Her watercolor and ink illustrations on Bristol board that were printed and framed with colorful mats and 8x10 gold frames, sold in the Carousel ChristmasShoppe on River Street. As customers asked for specific animals, Helen

photographed them in detail and created new illustrations.

As a member of In-Town Gallery at the time, since it is next to Coolidge Park, it was convenient for Helen to visit the carousel for her research. She called her collection "Portraits on Parade" and sold notecards as well as various-sized matted and framed prints.

There were annual 'reunions' of the carvers at the Carousel, and Helen became acquainted with most of them, so they and their unique creations were like family.

Now, some years after Helen had 'retired' from this endeavor but still had an inventory, she learned of an opportunity to share her Carousel prints with a wider audience. Chattanooga Erlanger Hospital was building a new Childrens' Hospital, and as part of their Arts at Erlanger program were looking for decorations for this new facility. Helen approach ed the committee with her offer to donate 33 of her 11x14 framed Carousel prints. They accepted.

Helen commissioned Region III member artist Ann Rutledge for the framing job as her skills would make a professional presentation.

(PHOTOSHOP is not the only software available for color correction but it is the one I am most familiar with. There may even be some free software out there to do simple color correction. Use "color correcting for artists" to begin your search for information.)

Realistically, it is impossible to cover all of the possibilities of the color correction process for this article because of the varying degrees of computer experience our members have.

YOU-TUBE IS A VALUABLE RESOURCE to find step-by-step video tutorials of the image adjustment/color correction process. Here is a link to one resource I found helpful:

At times it can be very confusing and challenging if you have limited knowledge of computers and software. If that is the case, please SEEK A PROFESSIONAL who can take your copy shot and make adjustments and color correct your image.SHOP AROUND for the best price and the most knowledgeable person available in your area.

Whether you are a DIY person or enlist professional help with the color correction process, the goal is to always SUBMIT THE BEST PROFESSIONAL QUALITY REPRESENTATION OF YOUR ORIGINAL ARTWORK.

\* Image files for printing are high resolution CMYK color. Image files for web viewing are lower resolution RGB color. The bestcase scenario would be to prepare two separate files from your original digital artwork file—one for print and one for web.

# FAQ

## Frequently Asked Questions wendy Latimer

Tennessee Watercolor Society - WHO we are and WHY certain rules of eligibility exist.

Our History: In brief, is in all of our Exhibition Catalogs and on our website: www.tnws.org. Well worth your time to read it.

Membership: We are a nonjuried membership organization, meaning there is no jurying process to become a member. We welcome members, over the age of 18, at any point in their Artist's journey, from beginner to the most successful professional. All members are valuable to TnWS. Our hope is that our members will mentor each other.

Why the Acronym TnWS?
All caps but lower case 'n'- not all caps? Around 2000 Texas Watercolor Society claimed the only rights to TWS (which we had also used for decades). They had it first, so we had to

ades). They had it first, so we had to change our *legal acronym* to TnWS. Mary Neville came up with the new designation.

Non Profit? Yes, we are a 501©3. That sets up how we handle and make financial decisions. Tax rules are followed closely and Federal rules must be adhered to, even in setting up some rules of our operation.

Paid Employees? NO! Since our forming in 1971 we have been a 100% volunteer organization. We depend on our members to volunteer to build and maintain our community, our events, our progress, and all board activities.

Division of Responsibilities

Think about it - we formed before computers were the way of the day! Phones were attached to the wall and you couldn't make a call on your camera! It took a lot of work to last 47 years. There were years when we faced closing due to lack of help, but we are currently strong with a full board and moving forward. We cannot rest on that. We all need to participate and support! Many successful and large State and National Arts organizations are closing due to lack of volunteers. Be interested, read our newsletters, and get involved!

Small Communities: How to find them in such a large state: TnWS builds statewide strength while building small communities. We call them our Regional communities. Each Region has its own Arts opportunities and cultural identities. But we come together on statewide activities, and quite successfully! Our Regions are based on the TN Metropolitan areas: I - Memphis, II - Nashville, III - Chattanooga, IV - Knoxville, and V - Tri-Cities in the northeast corner.

Regional Contacts: Each Region has a volunteer Contact, or Team, to help you find community. See the list in the newsletters and on our website.

#### Where is Our Home Base?

While we do not have a brick-andmortar-home, we do have our Newsletters, easy communication by email, and a professionally maintained website. All serve to provide a center of community.

TnWS website: Our largest budgeted expense is our website: www.tnws.org. With a constantly changing board and membership, it is our most important home-base expense. Hard copied, mailed newsletters used to be a large expense, but now are sent by email.

#### Newsletters: ArtBeat and Medium

Confused? Why two differently named newsletters? Before computers, TnWS had occasional, mailed newsletters. Carbon copies! In 2002 Wendy Latimer wanted to develop a system of communication that would be the "heart" of TnWS. Helen Burton came up with the name "ArtBeat". It is published in Spring and Fall. Between them the board would need to communicate with the membership. So Jan Batts and Wendy came up with "Medium" a shorter, broadbased newsletter.

seums and Galleries across the state. Artist selection for a Juried Exhibition awards 1 point each towards Signature Membership, for a total of 3 points to earn that valued status.

Online Statewide Biennial Juried Exhibitions: Starting in 2013, with the addition and reliability of a professionally maintained website, www.tnws.org, then President Barbara Jernigan added Biennial Online Statewide Juried Exhibitions on the odd years. In 2018 it was voted upon to award a half point per artist's selection in the online exhibition to apply towards the 3-point total earning Signature.

Biennial Juror Eligibility: It is in our bylaws that our Statewide Juried Exhibitions can only be juried by Nationally / Internationally known, published and experienced Artist Jurors. Tennessee Artists, past or present residents, can't be jurors.

Artwork Eligibility: Our mission is to preserve the artwork genre of AQUEOUS WATERCOLOR and AQUEOUS WATER MEDIA ON PAPER. See our complete Mission and Purpose statements www.tnws.org or in any Exhibition Catalog. As we are on paper, PRESENTATION rules apply for white / off-white mats, framed behind Plexiglas and wired for hanging. Frames can be wood or metal but simple in style and secure. These rules are spelled out in even more detail in our biennial prospectuses. PLEASE READ ALL RULES IN THE PRO-**SPECTUS** to avoid disappointment of disqualification. It is your responsibility to read the rules of application and eligibility. All works must be the ORIGINAL ARTWORK of the Artist.
