

Our Exhibition can be compared with a Hollywood production, perhaps on a smaller scale. It requires a good story, our 50-year history, and a script that brings it up to date. The director

is our chair with assistant directors for the various chapters, and a cast of characters who bring the scenes to life. Of course, the starring actors and actresses are given top billing. But you all have seen the lengthy list of supporting roles at the end of the credits and the behind-the-scenes workers who make it all run smoothly. Also, an important component of any successful production is financial support in the form of major backers as well as individual investors.

The **2022 Juried Biennial Exhibition** certainly "fills the bill" with this description. Location is a vital component, and Chattanooga reprised its role as the scene of the First Exhibition in 1972. With a different cast of characters, a similar scenario took place at AVA. Almost three years of preliminary preparation included selection of that "stage", contracting with our star juror, **Stan Miller,** and retaining the location for our Opening Day Celebration. Writing the script (the Prospectus), the guide for all the actors and actresses (our artist members) and posting all the instructions on the storyboard (our website), got the cameras rolling. The scenery is spectacular - 60 individual works of art that show the outstanding talents of our members that no Hollywood set could achieve. Their performances were richly rewarded with applause and special recognition. There is no need for a lengthy list here.

The 2022 Exhibition Catalog is our Playbill. Every actor's role is listed, whether on the Roster of Members, Exhibitors, Executive Board, Committees, or various positions. You are all stars in my program!


If asked for a statement about art, I usually quote Elbert Hubbard, "Art is not a Thing. It is a Way."

When something needs to be done, she steps up and does it. During multiple tenures as president for **TnWS**, she led the organization into the digital world. She helped implement innovations such as the online exhibition and website upgrades that allowed online dues payments and

show entries. As treasurer, she moved record-keeping into a digital format, making the job more streamlined and efficient. Barbara is passionate about painting and art and loves painting both in the studio and en plein air. She is not afraid of failure and is willing to push her boundaries with new ideas and techniques. It is a joy to work and paint alongside her. She has been and still is an incredible asset **TnWS**.

Jan Alice: How did you get involved with the Tennessee Watercolor Society?

Barbara: In 2004, I moved to Johnson City from St Petersburg, Florida, where I was a member of the **Florida Watercolor Society**. I immediately joined the **Tennessee**

Watercolor Society. **TnWS's** Tri-Cities region was not a separate region at that time, but I thought this mountain area should be its own region. **Wendy Latimer** was president, and she agreed with the idea of reviving the region; I agreed to be in charge of the revival and have been ever since.

What was your first volunteer position? I was asked to be Treasurer of **TnWS**. This was not a surprise, because I have a CPA, and CPAs are not that common in the arts professions (laughing). I agreed to take the job, and it led to other jobs: Vice President, President, Regional Coordinator, and Treasurer again.

What is the TnWS volunteer work that you enjoy the most? I truly enjoy being a Regional Rep and bringing people from my region into TnWS. Many of these members have become

Signature members. In fact, our region has the highest percentage of Signature members of all the regions in the society (which is easy with only 12 members)! My joy has been to get people who are wonderful artists to step out of their comfort zones and try new things such as entering **TnWS** shows. Along with former member **Patsy Reading**, and in honor of two former well-known watercolorists in this area, we began a show for East Tennessee, then called **Newell Hendershot**, now called **NETN** (**Northeast Tennessee**) **Watermedia Innovations Exhibition**. It was sponsored by the local art leagues and TnWS and many east Tennessee watercolorists entered. When **TNWS** member **Sharon Neuhaus** died, we changed the name to honor her as well.

What have you learned from your volunteer work for TnWS? It's been an opportunity to develop relationships with people I would not have known on such an intimate level, including nationally and internationally known artists. I have made some really wonderful friends and continue to make new friends — I think this is a great reason for people to volunteer for TnWS.

How do you manage your time in order to volunteer? During all the years I have held offices in **TnWS**, I have worked full-time... but I am a single woman with grown children. We need to make it easier for people who work full-time and have families to do volunteer work. This should be a major goal.

If you want to ask another person to do volunteer work, how do you go about it? I have had good success with asking people to volunteer. People who are willing usually have a lot of things on their plate already, but they have a work ethic and are task oriented. You just must ask, and be gracious if they say no. If members know the organization is going to honor and listen to their members, and if they know they will have a strong support team, they are often willing to volunteer.

What was your biggest challenge in accomplishing your volunteer work? I would say the biggest challenge was taking TnWS into this century with technology! When I was president, we redid the website with Hillhouse Creative, professional web-designers, and initiated online entry for exhibitions. Also, while serving as president, I developed the first online show with Linda Campbell and spearheaded the digitization of publications. Once in place, these developments saved countless volunteer hours, lowered expenses, and prepared us to survive the pandemic.

Do you have any more you'd like to say about volunteering for TnWS? Volunteering for TnWS can be one of the more rewarding things a person can do. You can make wonderful friends, meet internationally known artists in workshops and at exhibitions, and learn a lot about watercolor itself.

Most of all, there is a great deal of satisfaction in knowing you have helped other artists achieve their potential.

Registration opens **July 20** and closes **September 15, 2022**. Class will run from 9 to 3 daily with a short break mid-day. Instruction will be done virtually and only available during the class times. No recording will be available. All experience levels are welcome.

2 to 3 paintings will be taught in the two days of the virtual workshop. **Day 1** will cover techniques and exercises Todd uses during the morning, then after a short break students can apply that knowledge on simple piece or pieces. (1/8 or 1/4 sheet scraps are good for this. On **Day 2**, students can paint their own subject matter or get direction from Todd on subject matter. Two paintings will be worked on during day two.

continue their journeys for the ultimate symbol of peace...ART.



Forgotten Camp Canoes by Jan Ducharme








