

TnWS Sandy Washburn In Person Workshop



This three-day workshop will focus on the abstract portrayal of interior spaces. The title is a play on words that denotes actual room/ building interiors, as well as the emotional connotation that we each build inside our being based on life experiences. Through the use of representational and symbolic imagery, we will construct a piece that is at once abstract and representational, a genre that I like to call - point of departure. Class participants will learn to plan a composition, to mix intermediate colors, and to select a palette based on color symbolism and preferences.

Appropriate for both beginners and experienced painters, some experience with fluid acrylics would be helpful.

The Healing Arts: Our Artist Members' Projects and Journeys

Ginna Priest: "Sharing My Art To Help Others"

It all started when my golden retriever, Kazzy, and I became registered as Pet Partners and I decided to visit the Sarah Cannon Cancer Center. First, we visited family and friends in the waiting room who were eager to spend some time with a friendly and happy dog while their loved ones had their radiation treatments. The surprising experience was how important it was to visit the nurses and staff who poured to the waiting room to get their time loving Kazzy. Soon we were allowed to visit the floors where patients were having surgeries, infusions and chemotherapy treatments and I noticed that many of the TVs were tuned to the news and other programs which brought anything but happiness into the patient's environment.



That proved to be the beginning of a long journey as I set out to create DVDs with my photographs and soothing music, hoping that the beauty of nature and music would bring calm and stillness into the lives of those who needed a reminder that there IS still beauty in their world.

Since I knew no one who had created DVDs, I first researched applications to create slide shows and learned how to use it. I explored the choices available, like zooming in or out and fading the photos to make a gentle transition from one to the next one. Using photographs from many trips to the Smoky Mountain National Park became my first movie.

I then began searching for music and eventually found that the sister of my good friend's roommate had a recording studio on Music Row. Robin Ruddy and Jimmy Nichols agreed to create music that matched the seasons of the Park for my DVD named *Still Point I - In the Smokies*.

Since that was an expensive solution, I next searched for CDs and in time found one created by California pianist, Jeanette Alexander. I bought the rights to use 7 of her songs for my second DVD *Still Point II - In the Garden*, using photographs I had taken for many years of the seasons in my wooded garden.

I next created 3 more DVDs: *Meditations in Nature 1, 2 and 3*. Each has 6 five-minute movies, using royalty-free music, on various topics like "Down by the Seashore", "Tennessee in Winter", "Fern Fantasy", "At the Aquarium", "Spring in the Smokies" and "At the Zoo."

Next, I began exploring the world of printing the movies I had created as DVDs. I chose DiscMaker and they created my first DVDs: *Still Point I* and *Still Point II*. It was only when I received 1000 copies of each one that I realized hospital rooms have no DVD players!

Switching gears, I contacted every assisted living and dementia residence and delivered DVDs to each program director who showed any interest. One lady told me she used them during the evening meal as a way to slow the day down and help their residents find the

calmness they needed be ready for their bedtime routine.

My sister-in-law is a VA Social Worker and I asked her if there was a way she could use them in some way with her sessions with veterans with PTSD. Inspired by the positive and beneficial results, I began a thorough search and contacted many Nashville organizations that served the military community like the Nashville VA, Hope and Healing at Hillenglade, and Centerstone.

I've also given to a program that was created by James Howard of Veterans and Athletes United In Virginia which provides solutions for disabled veterans so they can do the activities they loved to



do before their injuries occurred. VETNET RVA, also in Virginia, connects veterans and their families with local resources for jobs, benefits, education, and family life.

Recently organizations like Mending Hearts and Thistle Farm who help women find the new life they deserve are finding ways to use the DVDs. I've given over 2500 DVDs since 2019.

In March 2019, I began posting my photographs on Instagram and Facebook with the hope that seeing the beauty of nature, even for a few minutes, would bring calm and stillness to those who were ill, isolated, lonely, fearful, or stressed in the changing world of COVID. A therapist for veterans told me that her vets all use their phones. So, I told her about my page in LinkedIn that has some of the movies as well as information about my website.

While learning each step in the process had its challenges, sharing my art to help others brought me much satisfaction and pleasure.

Arts Advocate

Tennesseans for the Arts (TFTA) hosted the annual Arts Advocacy Day on March 9th. The Zoom meeting was attended by 227 participants from across the state; Lil Clinard represented TnWS. The video of the meeting is available on www.tn4arts.org. The purpose of the event is to encourage people in the arts to step forward, be counted, and raise the volume of our voices to our state legislators in support of the arts. Segments of the program were designed to:

1. Raise awareness of the pending legislation relevant to arts funding.

The current relevant legislation is the Tennessee State omnibus funding bill. TFTA efforts are directed at protecting the Special License Plate funding for the arts.

2. Introduce TFTA staff and board members.

Parker Kennedy serves as the president of TFTA and has a small staff, the board members represent each region in Tennessee. Their names are listed on the website.

3. Introduce TN State Senators and Representatives who support the arts.

The senators and representatives of greatest interest are those that serve on the Arts Caucus of the General Assembly. These are also listed on the web site. Three were present for the meeting: Sen. Raumesh Akbari D- Memphis, Sen. Becky Massey R-Knoxville, and Speaker of the House Cameron Sexton R-Crossville.

4. Announce upcoming Regional Arts Advocacy Meetings:

May 16, Chattanooga, Chattanooga Theater Center, 5:30-7:30 pm May 18, Knoxville, Knoxville Museum of Art, 5:30-7:30 pm May 23, Memphis, Playhouse on the Square, 5:30-7:30 pm

June 12, Cumberland, Cumberland County Playhouse, 5:30-7:30 pm

5. Encourage support for the Specialty License Plate program for the arts.

Each of you can support by purchasing an Arts Category Specialty License Plate. Anne Pope, Executive Director of the Tennessee Arts Commission (TAC), pointed out that 80% of the funding for the Tennessee Arts Commission grants comes from the sale of these specialty plates. Last year TAC was able to award \$9.3 million in grants and aid to individuals, organization or activities representing all 95 counties. Go buy your specialty arts plate today. You can buy them any time not just at your plate's renewal date.

- The plates are available to all Tennessee residents from your county clerk's office.
- They require an annual fee of \$35; of that fee a portion is allocated to the Tennessee Arts Commission.
- For an additional fee of \$35 your specialty plate can be personalized between three and seven characters.

Introduction and Interview by Lil Clinard

TnWS is so fortunate that when we needed Pam, she needed us. Pam grew up, was a student, a teacher, retiree and helpmate to her husband Bill; then he died in 2019. Pam realized she could do what she wanted, not answering to anybody. So, she decided to live boldly, to grow and bloom. Art, a pursuit of 30 years, was a part of that plan. She took workshops, joined local art groups and TnWS. She volunteered to serve as TnWS' First Vice President and took over the Presidency when Lynn Stilwell moved out of state. It doesn't

stop there; she is also the editor of the ArtBeat and took on many other volunteer jobs and activities. I have served with Pam on the Board of TnWS for the last three years and I have found her to be not only a capable and organized person, but one of the most caring people I know. Even in Washington state, she continues to serve on the board and is helping transition the ArtBeat to a new editor.

How did you get into volunteering for the Tennessee Watercolor Society? What was your first volunteer position?

I moved into the Region II area in 2013 and in 2018 I saw Tuva Stephens on PBS. I reached out to her and heard about the TnWS Exhibition in Humboldt. Then, Wendy Latimer called and asked if I might consider serving as 1st VP of TnWS. I thought it could be a traveling job going across the state to regional meetings. My husband Bill had just died, and I had lived in all the regions except Region V, so I thought I could do it and would enjoy doing it, seeing friends and family, and meeting TnWS members.



When you were thinking of volunteering for something, did you consider your own skills and what you enjoy doing?

Yes, I'm an organizer and have always been good at anticipating what a person might need. I was always like the "church mouse" in our church, helping out in the background, and I had always helped my husband, both at work and around the house/farm, stay organized.

What is the TnWS volunteer work that you enjoyed the most?

Meeting people, especially in-person in Chattanooga. And enjoyed serving on a tight knit group on the board of TnWS. I also enjoyed helping with the Soon Warren workshop, learning how to use YouTube for interactive workshops. Of course, I like seeing the Newsletter coming to completion for distribution to the members.

What have you learned from your volunteer work in TnWS?

It's true "many hands make light work. Especially when like-minded people work together and its FUN." And I've learned Zoom and Online skills and using digital ways of working on the Newsletter.

How do you manage your time in order to volunteer?

Prioritize! I make a list and love to check them off. In fact, when I get a job done and it isn't on the list, I put it on the list so I can check it off. Ha, ha.

If you want to ask another person to do volunteer work, how do you go about it?

Service to others is the price you pay for your room here on earth. Mohammed Ali.

Service is required to keep TnWS going. The skill set needs to match the personality. So, I talk to the person to see if it's a match; then explain the job. You must spell out what the job is. I believe that if you want to be a member, you need to serve.

What have you enjoyed most about your volunteer work?

What was your biggest challenge in accomplishing the volunteer work?

Resistance to change. The seed will not grow if you don't change the soil by feeding and working it.

Do you have any more you'd like to say about volunteering for TnWS?

I fear TnWS will become extinct if we don't loosen the reigns a bit. That does NOT mean we need to expect less, it means let go to let creativity flow; therefore we need to seek ways to increase diversity and ways to serve others. Many creative artists are doing wonderful things with water media, but they wouldn't adhere to our rules and standards. That is not to say they are not doing quality artwork. As they say we need to think and get out of the box.

How to Keep a Volunteer Organization Going

It's been said that 10% of an all-volunteer organization does 80% of the work. I don't know if it's true, but each member should feel a responsibility to volunteer in some capacity if they are taking advantage of membership opportunities. Any volunteer help is good help. Watercolor societies can't survive without consistent volunteerism from the majority of the membership. The better ratio would be 80% of the membership does 100% of the work.
