I am happy to report our Online Exhibition was well received and the work is of high caliber. Our juror **Mary**

Ann Beckwith did a splendid job making her selections. Congratulations to all: the participants, the Exhibition Team, and the Website Team. Even with \$2,600 in awards given to six (6) winners, the Online Exhibition was financially successful, ending with a small surplus. We are in the process of reviewing our prospectus for the 2024 Exhibition and what changes we may need to make. An area to think about is how we could increase participation. Do we consider lower fees? Do we consider expanding what we accept? Think about these things and let us know your thoughts. Planning has already started for the 2026 Exhibition. Members will vote on the 2026 juror/workshop leader during the **July 15** Zoom Membership Meeting.

Tennessee Watercolor Society Biennial Exhibitions2024 TnWS Biennial Exhibition and Workshop

Save the date!!! The 2024 TnWS Biennial Workshop will be held at the Knoxville Museum of Art on May 14 thru May 17, 2024. The workshop instructor will be Don Andrews from Austin, Texas. Don is a nationally known watercolor artist and workshop instructor, known for his figure and landscape paintings highlighted with glowing granular washes and vibrant light and is an active member and past board director of the American Watercolor Society. He has conducted painting workshops throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico, Europe and Africa for over 35 years.

Registration for the workshop will begin **September 1, 2023**. The registration form and more details will be on the **TnWS** website at that time.

If you plan to attend the **2024 TnWS Biennial Exhibition** and/or and the associated activities, and need a place to stay – **TnWS** has made arrangements with the Crowne Plaza in Knoxville to accommodate you. 2026 TnWS Biennial Exhibition

Region II – Middle TN announces that the **TnWS Exhibition 2026** will be hosted by the Customs House Museum and Cultural Center in Clarksville. To reserve the best galleries across the state, the board works 3 to 4 years in advance. It is also why, while Knoxville is in the process of organizing Exhibition 2024, we are completing the important 2026 process for choosing from the best jurors.

TnWS Exhibition 2026 is scheduled to begin on May 1, 2026 with delivery. Installation, workshop, opening activities with the Exhibition itself follows through the rest of May to July 19. More details and dates TBA following the 2024 Exhibition.

Tennessee Watercolor Society 2023 Online Exhibition

We hope you have all enjoyed the **Online Exhibition** posted on the **TnWS** website. Congratulations to the 40 artists whose paintings were selected by juror **Mary Ann Beckwith**. Kudos to **Mary Ann** for selecting a well-rounded representation of paintings; thanks to all that entered; and congratulations to all selected. As a result of being accepted three members attained signature status: **Leslie Aguilar**, **Todd Saal** and **Gayla Seale**.

We had 53 artists who entered 114 paintings into the 2023 Online Exhibit. The entries break down as follows: Total Artists – 53 representing 20.5% of **TnWS** membership

R I: 8 Artists for 21% of their members

R II: 25 Artists for 22% of their members

R III: 8 Artists for 17.8% of their members

R IV: 9 Artists for 18% of their members

R V: 3 Artists for 25% of their members.







Since then, I have held just about every officer position and chairperson role including chief bottle washer. I have never regretted my decision to get involved. I am a believer in Karma and the general idea that you have to give to receive. The experience and friendships, that I have gained through my involvement with members of **TnWS**, is priceless. It has been a privilege to learn from our extraordinarily talented members who give so freely of their considerable knowledge. While many of our treasured members, over the years, have passed, I still work to honor and preserve their contributions.

Today, I still place a great deal of importance on supporting Art Organizations and will take over as President of the Nashville Artist Guild later this year (not for the first time). Being an Artist can be a lonely occupation but getting involved with other creative beings can be a lifeline. You must actually participate to benefit!

One of the best decisions I have ever made is getting involved with the Healing Arts Project, Inc (HAPI). I have been with HAPI for over fifteen years, being compensated as an independent contractor. Founded in 2004, HAPI provides artistic opportunities for persons with mental health issues that promote healing, community awareness and inclusion. HAPI facilitates free art classes and creative writing classes (including all supplies). Taught by professional artists, they also host art exhibitions and other community outreach projects. My involvement with the **HAPI** program has been both inspiring and rewarding to me. Working with **HAPI** participants, I have had the opportunity to see individuals transform through their artwork. I have seen self-esteem and confidence soar. And, I

have witnessed self-worth and social skills discovered. It is a heart-warming experience that I treasure. I have seen masterpieces take on life.

I currently also teach a weekly Art Program at a Nashville Rehabilitation Center. Again, as an independent contractor, my entire teaching schedule is on a part time basis which allows flexibility for me to pursue my own art.

Lastly, in the past, I taught at Senior and Assisted Living Facilities. Kids often baffle me, but seniors are in my wheelhouse! They are another great opportunity to lead art classes. I

encourage Artists to approach Healing Arts Programs, Senior Centers and ALC's in your area for an enriching, volunteer or paid teaching opportunity. Art is Healing!

TnWS members are arts advocates! **TnWS** members have done an exceptional job of advocating for water media and arts in general by participating in art exhibits far and wide over the past year. Our members have shown the power and beauty of water media in local, regional, state (TN, GA, NY, KY, AL, MI, AR, NC, VA, TX), national and international (National, American, and Southern watercolor societies; American Impressionist Society, Watercolor USA, Watercolor West, Society of Watercolor Artists) venues. Members, too many to mention individually, have won awards and honors in these juried exhibitions. Every region has hosted local shows to showcase the artistic talents of their members and the value of water media painting. Kudos to nine of our members who had solo shows this last year.

Additionally, **TnWS** members have demonstrated and taught water media workshops and classes. Twenty-three different classes were mentioned in the ArtBeat this past year. Also,

members have freely given their time to demonstrate water media skills and techniques in various venues from local art groups to children's school classes.

These activities not only advocate for water media and the arts but support the **TnWS** mission to elevate the stature of watercolor and educate the public to the significance of watercolor as an important, creative, permanent painting medium and to further the interests of painters in all watermedia.

Golden Volunteer for this issue: **Kathleen Haynes**Introduction and Interview by **Alyssa Peacock Leonard**

Kathleen Haynes is a fascinating person and artist. There are so many fun and interesting facts about her that my interview could capture only a few.

Kathleen grew up on a family farm in Sumner County. She said that right out of college (UT Knoxville), she lived in a number of other states across the country as a military wife, including Hawaii, but she never lost the bond she has with the natural beauty of Tennessee. She carries a watercolor kit in her car, so she can stop to paint in a fencerow beside the road. She trespasses onto farms, careful to close gates, in order to paint freshly-baled hay and old barns. She is a founding member of Sumner County's Bugg Hollow Plein Air Painters, and the only one always using watercolor.

Kathleen's career in Customer Service management was all left-brain. So were her degrees in English and Business. But watercolor was a lifetime dream. She began taking classes as she neared retirement and says she quickly lost her heart. She firmly believes that to succeed with watercolors, you have to be "charmed" by the medium.

How did you get into volunteering for TnWS? What was your first volunteer position?

Shortly after becoming a **TnWS** member, I got to know **Wendy Latimer**, who was President at the time. Wendy asked if I would take the Arts Advocacy position, which was always hard to fill. She knew that my brother was in the Senate at the time, which might be an advantage. I had no idea what Arts Advocacy was, but I agreed. I served in the position for over fifteen years.

When you were thinking of volunteering for something, did you consider your own skills and what you enjoy doing?

Yes, I'm usually in if I think I can make a difference. It has to be close enough to my heart that I will give up "painting time" for it. Advocacy ... especially about watercolor ... I'll coerce anyone who will stand still and listen.

What TnWS volunteer work have you enjoyed the most?

Although I love helping with Region II exhibits and events, the Arts Advocacy position has been the most fascinating, without question. On one of my first trips to the Legislature, I was invited to attend the Governor's Arts Awards and that was unforgettable. I enjoyed keeping abreast of the major arts associations, plus the state and national policies being legislated

that affect the arts. I liked reporting to our members how they could take action and make a difference. Also, I have had opportunity to meet and learn from all sizes and types of organizations across the state, from the ballet to little community theaters in the country. We all face similar issues, just the scale is different.

What have you learned from your volunteer work with TnWS?

I have learned how important personal, one-on-one advocacy can be. Every artist should think of him/herself as an arts advocate. No training required, no special qualifications. No matter where you are, you can inspire a young artist, look for venue opportunities, invite your child's teacher to our exhibit, thank your local elected officials for supporting the arts, or remind friends that specialty license tags fund art grants all over the state. If art puts joy into your life, "work the room." It will make a difference.

What have you enjoyed the most about your volunteer work?

For me, "skin in the game" is all service to my community. I simply love being involved. It justifies the air that I breathe.

How do you manage your time in order to volunteer?

As a retiree, my volunteer time vies with "painting time." The nearest deadline will get the most attention.

If you want to ask another person to do volunteer work, how do you go about it?

I ask them in person, just as **Wendy** did with me. A "personal ask" is more persuasive than any other. Also, it is more effective to "ask" regarding a specific job, rather than "wouldn't you like to help?"

What was your biggest challenge in accomplishing the volunteer work?

Apathy. So many artists concentrate on their own work and career, not realizing the breadth of influence they could have.

Do you have any more you'd like to say about volunteering for TnWS?

TnWS has built a highly respected statewide organization on the shoulders of some very dedicated members and many years of work. I would ask our members to not lose sight of the history and traditions that precede us and are responsible for our success. I believe we should "work to our strengths."

How to Keep a Volunteer Organization Going

It's been said that 10% of an all-volunteer organization does 80% of the work. I don't know if it's true, but each member should feel a responsibility to volunteer in some capacity if they are taking advantage of membership opportunities. Any volunteer help is good help. Watercolor societies can't survive without consistent volunteerism from the majority of the membership. The better ratio would be 80% of the membership does 100% of the work.

Volunteer time management is like any other task. You find the time that fits into your personal schedule and responsibilities and get it done the best you know how in the time frame you're required to accomplish it.

Volunteerism is a collaborative enterprise: many personalities have many ideas which must be distilled into a coherent message which stays on brand while advancing the mission of **TnWS**. Many dedicated, talented people continue to do this year after year.

More About Volunteering for TnWS

Selecting Golden Volunteers is one way **TnWS** recognizes and honors its dedicated volunteers. Watercolor societies like **TnWS** can't survive without an involved, enthusiastic cadre of volunteers. It is essential for all members to consider volunteering, in some capacity, to guarantee the continued success of the organization well into the future. It is also very important, as our membership ages, that we recruit younger watermedia painters into the organization.


