

As we go into 2024, I'd like to thank all the volunteers



# **2024 Biennial Juried Exhibition Prospectus**



# 2024 Biennial Juried Exhibition

Don Andrews - Juror, Awards Judge and

## **Artist Eligibility**

The exhibition is open to artists 18 years of age and older who reside in Tennessee or meet the requirements of membership.

## **Works of Art Eligibility**

The artwork must have been completed since February 2021 and not shown in any previous juried TnWS exhibition, including online. Each artist may submit up to THREE images, but only ONE is eligible for inclusion.

#### Fees:

Members: \$40 for the first entry, \$10 for the second, \$10 for the third (\$40, \$50, \$60) Non-Members: \$80 for the first entry, \$10 for the second, \$10 for the third (\$80, \$90, \$100)

## Requirements

**Originality:** The painting must be completely the artist's own original work – idea, content, and composition. Reference photos must be taken only by the artist. No copies of another's work or photos, published images, copyrighted material, "free online images." No paintings can be done under instruction whether online or in person.

**Watermedia:** Any water-based media is acceptable (watercolor, acrylics, gouache, casein, egg tempera, water-based ink (not water-based oil) applied in an aqueous manner (no thick paint or raised surface.) Graphite and watercolor pencils must be dissolved. Drawing or pencil marks cannot be the main element of the painting, only as guidelines or details.

**Substrate:** The material painted on MUST be paper or synthetic paper like YUPO, or illustration board. There are many brands and types of watercolor paper.

**Size:** The minimum size can be 9 inches in any direction. This can include the 1/8 inch under the mat.

**Framing:** Simple, plain, un-adorned (no carving, decorations, filets, liners, etc.) wood or metal, in natural, gold, silver, or black, maximum 2 inches wide face must be used. The inside minimum size is 13 inches. The outside maximum size is 48 inches in any direction. The frame must be well constructed for shipping and handling. The frame must be wired for hanging with flat hardware (no sawtooth hangers or screw eyes) and wire ends taped.

**Glazing:** Plexiglas is REQUIRED (for safe shipping and handling) in good condition (no scratches, etc.) and properly sized for the frame.

**Matting:** Acid-free white/off-white mat with white core is REQUIRED, minimum of 2 inches wide around all sides of the painted image. Multiple mats are okay. NO color liners.

**Digital Entries:** You will need to prepare the image of your painting in this manner: Take a high- quality (squared-up) photo of the painting only (unframed painting to avoid glare) and crop it to just the image, correctly oriented (horizontal or vertical.) Open the file and change the resolution to a minimum of 300 pixels per inch, up to a maximum of 1800 pixels on the LONGER side, saved as maximum quality not to exceed 3 megabytes. Name the file as: Artist Name (LastFirst)\_PaintingTitle\_size (HxW).

Example: DoeJane RedTulips 20h12w.

**EMAIL IMAGE FILES TO:** tnws.exhibitions@gmail.com. The ENTRY FORM (including these instructions) will be on the website prior to the JANUARY 1 to FEBRUARY 15, 2024 entry period. This allows time for you to obtain assistance if necessary. Complete the Entry Form and pay the Entry Fee to complete the process. For help, contact the TnWS Intake Chair.

**Sales:** A TnWS contract will be available in the event a painting is sold. This contract will be signed by the venue and the buyer and will provide contact information. The artist is responsible for negotiating shipping terms with the buyer and ensuring delivery at the close of the Exhibition or Traveling Exhibit. The painting must stay with the Exhibition and Traveling Exhibit (if the painting is chosen for the Traveling Exhibit) until the end.

I have carefully read all requirements listed in this prospectus and I understand that failure to meet ANY of the requirements may result in the disqualification of my entry and the possibility of ineligibility to enter future TnWS juried exhibitions for a minimum of two years.

#### IMPORTANT OPPORTUNITIES FOR ARTISTS

**The Totally Transparent Watercolor Award:** Artists who prepare their paintings using only transparent watermedia pigments with no white pigments, using only the white of the paper, can apply for this special award if their entry is accepted.

**The Traveling Exhibit:** 30 paintings selected by the juror to travel for six months visiting four different galleries across the state is a special honor.

**Exhibition Awards:** An impressive number of generous cash and merchandise awards, including Best of Show are presented to award winners at the end of the workshop week and after the General Meeting. The images of all the accepted paintings and award winners will be prominently displayed on the TnWS website and in the full-color published exhibition catalog received by all members and sponsors, as well as, available for sale to the public at each venue.

# **Don Andrews Workshop**

Don's Landscape Workshop is geared specifically for artists eager to paint and study in a no-stress studio environment. Each day, Don will address major visual concerns; light, color, granulation, organizing nature, and utilizing negative space are just a few subjects to be covered.

Don's class is not geared to any specific level of achievement; artists of all levels will benefit from a more personal understanding of the painting possibilities available in the exciting world of landscape painting. This workshop will be packed with demonstrations, discussions, individual help, and personal and group critiques.

# **HELPFUL TIP: Resizing Images**

Often, we have trouble getting our painting images sized to meet the prospectus requirements. For the TnWS 2024 Biennial Exhibition, the requirement is:

### (Except from the 2024 Prospectus)

**Digital Entries:** You will need to prepare the image of your painting in this manner: Take a high-quality (squared-up) photo of the painting only (unframed painting to avoid glare) and crop it to just the image, correctly oriented (horizontal or vertical.) Open the file and change the resolution to 300 pixels per inch, sized to 1800 pixels on the LONGER side, save as maximum quality not to exceed 3 megabytes. Name the file as: Artist Name (LastFirst)\_PaintingTitle\_size (HxW).

Example: DoeJane\_RedTulips\_20h12w.

So how do I get my image to be 300 pixels per inch and 1800 pixels on the longer side? You can do it with the software on your PC or Mac, no additional software required. Go to these YouTube videos to see how.

# A Better Way to Support TnWS

When you renew your membership or join you can add a donation that goes to support the Beauty of Watermedia exhibition award. We have accumulated significant amounts since taking online donations, and our new donations form gives members the opportunity to contribute to other awards and programs safely via the website.

To donate to these other awards or programs, go into the special Members Section which is reached by clicking on the log in button on the top right of the opening page, then put in your username and password. If you have forgotten your password, you can create a new one and ask the site to remember it. If you have forgotten all of it contact your regional rep for assistance. Once there, you just scroll down to the donation area on the page.

You can contribute to the general funds of our organization, a regional award, another standing award like Transparent Watercolor, or a specific award that may be added such as a memorial for a member.

You may also enter an amount for some other **TnWS** event or program like the 2024 Exhibition Catalog printing, Student Scholarship, or the Biennial Reception. You must notify the treasurer by email about the specific event or program you want to fund. Her email is bbjernigan@gmail.com. Donations to establish a new fund, award, or program must be

approved by the board so contact the president or treasurer for information. Our established minimum for a free-standing award is \$250 though sometimes it can be increased by adding a merchandise award to it if it is short. Special funds must be at least \$500.

We encourage members to use this way of supporting the exhibitions and operations because mailing checks has become a concern with the potential loss of mail, inconsistencies in delivery, the fear that mail may be stolen or become a way for fraudsters to get information. PayPal offers a safer way to process payments. It also provides our organization with a better and consolidated accounting record. Remember, you do not have to have a PayPal account to use your credit or debit card to pay, you just enter your card information.

# The Healing Arts: Our Artist Members' Projects and Journeys

The Healing Power of Art: Our Artist Member's Journey.

## Featuring Marie Haas, Region III

Often this section of ArtBeat is delegated to awesome stories of how our members are using their creative talents to help others heal or grow from whatever life has dealt them, through classes, gifts of art, or other creative endeavors. This personal story is about how art has helped heal me. Much of it was posted on a blog on **my website** a few months ago, but since then additional stages of the journey have occurred and I have adapted it to fit this audience of fellow watercolor artists. I hope it may inspire someone in TnWS.

Sometimes things in my world get started in unexpected and unplanned ways. Through several experiences over the years, I have learned to trust my instincts, and instead of saying, "Let me think about it" something deep inside me says, "Why not?"

That was the case when a casual but important conversation about things-that-really-matter with Ocoee friend and neighbor, Aimee Brimhall McCord, somehow evolved into the



invitation to come to draw or paint at **Solstice Ranch** just "down the road apiece". Aimee has her own horses here and welcomes "horse people" to come to learn how to communicate better with their own horses. She has become well-known across the country as a sensitive and gifted teacher in these circles. I am not one of those "horse people." I had painted a few horses from photos and had attempted drawing them at a handful of equestrian events in the area over the years but I truly knew little about them other than "4 legs down and 2 ears up."

The backdrop of the conversation with **Aimee** was my husband's death the previous fall. In addition to being my soulmate and best friend, he was my biggest fan and supporter over my entire art-filled career. Losing his *physical* presence has brought a grief like I have never experienced before. Many of you who read this will know *exactly* what that means. There are no words. A new drawing experience seemed like it might be a good idea.

When weather permitted last spring, equipped with a brand new sketchbook, a portable chair, and a variety of my favorite pens and pencils, I joined **Aimee** and about 10 riders and their horses that had arrived for a clinic. My plan was to simply sit on the sidelines, observe

closely, and do gesture drawings as much as I could. Though I have been drawing fiddlers and banjo pickers, cats and dogs, and a few Native American dancers for a very long time, I quickly realized that drawing a horse is considerably different. All the parts are moving and even the slightest movement changes the line of the back or the position of a leg rather dramatically. I drew fast and furious and by the end of that first session, I had pretty much filled that sketchbook with scribbles that vaguely resemble horses. It was almost as if my hand was searching for a line that said "horse." My strokes were uncertain and hesitant, but occasionally inside I could feel a gentle shift happening toward awareness when the vision my eye saw was connecting directly to my heart and from there to my hand and then to the paper. That "eye-heart-hand response that bypasses the analytical brain" is something I learned over 40 years ago from friend and mentor **Dr. Frederick Franck**, whose many books on seeing/ drawing as meditation (The Zen of Seeing) have shaped my history as an artist. I have always enjoyed drawing this way but never anticipated how drawing (especially with this subject) would help me in my grieving.



Frederick would often quote the Zen masters who would say, "To know the flower, one must become the flower." Gradually I learned that to know the horse...to draw the horse...I would have to become the horse. The only way for me to do that is to draw often and mindfully until "no-thought" occurs and my hand simply responds to what my eye and heart see. Drawing this way is a meditation, a spiritual experience. I come away from each session with a lesson learned...... and not necessarily about drawing or about horses. As drawing sessions turned into weeks and now months, I started to see the line more accurately and authentically without an attempt to create my own personal style or to produce a marketable product. The drawings are "capturing" the spirit or essence of the horse.

A horse has become this particular horse. Gradually, and with no intention of this ever happening, the horses have also learned to know me, not just a person, but as this person who they now know and trust and care about. It is not unusual for one of the horses to greet me with her own variety of "hug." placing her head on my shoulder and rubbing her cheek against mine. A real connection has been made without riding them or even giving them a treat.

The time with them has been healing. When I am drawing them, all I think about is horse and "horseness". My drawings have become simpler and more authentic. I can just BE with them without judgment or expectation. So many things around the grieving process involve things that have to be done and simple tasks that become harder to do alone. The time with the horses has been a respite from those demands and has helped me deal with them. I am discovering that this 'exercise' of drawing with mindful awareness, Zen drawing, is about process and not product. As an artist for basically all of my life, I have been conditioned to look for a subject I can paint to create something that I might sell or could get into an exhibition or even win a prize. I have done a few workshops and read articles and books to learn tried and true techniques. Those are all reasonable activities that make sense and have been very important to my growth as an artist. But deep inside we all have probably experienced that wonderful feeling of creating something special that really comes from the heart. For me, I experience that most directly with drawing...with pencil or pen or brush.



The horses have reminded me of this, apparently something I needed to re-learn. Someone else may learn the same lesson from a cat, a garden, a mountain landscape, or a country road. "The meaning of life is to see" (Frederick Franck), not just with the eye but with the heart. This experience has taught me the importance of the very process itself of doing art in a deeply meaningful way. My art is that fun thing to do and enjoy that gives me peace and recalls the reason I wanted to be an artist in the first place.

My journey started with no particular goal in mind. Will something come from this? Quite likely. I have already "played" with some of the drawings, scanned them, and gleaned out the "duds" (and there are plenty.) Somewhere in the process, **Aimee** and I have started to see a collaboration of sorts developing. We are both open to that but also committed to listening to where the process is leading us. It has become pretty obvious to us and also to her students that there is a connection between their intuitive riding and the drawing that I am doing. Both have at their core the need to pay attention, to listen, to

see, to feel with the heart. This experience continues to unfold as a healing gift. If you are interested in following along, I post my progress regularly on my **Facebook** page, on the **TnWS** Facebook Page, and on Instagram. I would love to have you join me. Or if you need healing from a loss, I suggest you turn to your art—your heart— to help you do that.

# **Golden Volunteer**

## Gayla Dowdy Seale, Region IV

Introduction by **Alyssa Peacock Leonard**Interview by **Alyssa Peacock Leonard** 

Creating art has been a constant for **Gayla**. **Gayla's** art education has been mostly self-study and adult education. I personally appreciate her Zentangles. As a shining example of being a Golden Volunteer, Gayla has volunteered to chair the 2024 Biennial Exhibition.

How did you get into volunteering for the Tennessee Watercolor Society? What was your first volunteer position?

Shortly after I joined the **TnWs**, I was asked by newly elected President, Linn Stilwell, if I would be willing to serve on the **TnWs** Board in the position of Secretary. Both Linn and I had recently joined as new members, and she and I were both in Region IV. I felt that the position of Secretary would be a good fit for me.

When you were thinking of volunteering for something, did you consider your own skills and what you enjoy doing?

Knowing my personality, I feel more comfortable being in a supportive role rather than a leadership role, although I am capable of forming plans and seeing them to completion. My first love is painting and the creative life that comes with being an artist.

#### What is the TnWS volunteer work that you enjoyed the most?

I very much enjoyed my time on the Executive Board (2 years) as a way of being connected with other motivated and highly creative artists as we worked toward a common goal. The goal of the Board was to continue to make the **TnWS** a thriving and supportive organization for water media artist. I was honored to be a part of that group.

#### What have you learned from your volunteer work in TnWS?

Contributing as a volunteer for the **TnWS** has felt necessary in order to keep this valuable resource available and relevant. Also, I have gained insight, and have grown as an artist, so being a volunteer is a way to give back in return.

#### How do you manage your time in order to volunteer?

I manage time by planning my weekly calendar to include a specified time to devote solely to the purpose of the volunteer tasks needing attention. I try to stay organized and use the valuable tool of syncing my emails and documents across my devices and I have also used the Trello app for keeping track of projects.

#### If you want to ask another person to do volunteer work, how do you go about it?

I think that having confidence in others who work at being an artist is a key mindset in finding volunteers. Being an artist usually requires some internal motivation and creativity which can extend into serving as a volunteer. Most artists could serve as volunteers in some capacity depending on their life experiences and preferences.


